
TWO COMPANIONS ORDAINED TO THE PRIESTHOOD

On Saturday May 25, 2002
Archbishop Harry Flynn, DD, ordained to the diocesan priesthood two Companions of Christ, Rev. Michael Keating and Rev. Jay Kythe. They were part of a group of five men ordained this year at the Cathedral of St. Paul to minister in the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis. They bring the number of Companions of Christ presently serving as priests in the Archdiocese to 11. A couple other Companions are in seminary formation.

Fr. Keating (shown right, at the Imposition of Hands) begins his priestly ministry as Parochial Vicar of St. John the Baptist parish in New Brighton under the Pastorate of Fr. William Murtaugh. He fillsthe vacancy left by Companion Fr. Michael Becker (see story backpage) and will teach part-time at the University of St. Thomas and oversee students at the formation household on Marshall Avenue in St. Paul.

Fr. Kythe succeeds Companion of Christ Fr. Andrew Cozzens (see back page) as Parochial Vicar of the Catholic Communities of Faribault, pastored by Companion Fr. Kevin Finnegan. Fr. Kythe will live in the Companions household in Faribault with Fr. Finnegan and Fr.

Jon VanderPloeg, serving at St Dominic parish in Northfield.



Neither Fr. Keating nor Fr. Kythe is a Minnesota native. Fr. Keating grewup in Cleveland, Ohio and served in the United States and oversees invarious evangelistic and missionary organizations, through which he became familiar with the Companions of Christ. He completed seminary at the North American College in Rome and holds a PhD. in Church History from Notre Dame University.

Fr. Kythe's parents are natives of India, though he grew up in New Orleans. He was raised Hindu and became a Catholic in college where he found out about the Companions of Christ. Fr. Kythe graduated from the St. Paul Seminary in St. Paul and also holds an MA in Philosophy from the Franciscan University of Steubenville. FR. MICHAEL BECKER NAMED PASTOR

Companion of Christ Fr. Michael Becker was named Pastor of St. Michael parish in St. Michael, Minnesota July 1, 2002. He succeeded Fr. Leonard Siebenaler who retired after serving St. Michael for almost nine years.

Fr. Becker was ordained

May 1999 and served his first three years of priest-hood as Parochial Vicar (= Assistant Pastor) at St. John the Baptist of New Brighton. Recently ordained Fr. Michael Keating has taken Fr. Becker's place at St. John's (see front page).

St. Michael parish was founded by German Catholics in 1856 and the present church was built in 1892. The parish has about 1600 households, a grade school of 275 children, and is growing rapidly.

Fr. Becker lives in the Companions household in Dayton, MN with Frs. Peter Richards and Tom Margevicius.

FR. COZZENS TO BEGIN STUDIES IN ROME

At the request of Archbishop Harry Flynn Companion of Christ Fr. Andrew Cozzens will begin studying in Rome, Italy this Fall. His area of concentration will be Sacramental Theology, which he will likely eventually teach at the St. Paul Seminary School of Divinity.

Fr. Cozzens was ordained May 1997 and spent his first three years of priesthood as Parochial Vicar at the Cathedral of St. Paul. He was then transferred to Faribault and joined Fr. Kevin Finnegan in helping establish the Companions of Christ household there. After two years serving the Catholic Community of Faribault he was replaced by newlyordained Companion Fr. Jay Kythe.

For his MA thesis Fr. Cozzens examined the Eucharistic theology of Henri de Lubac. He can read theology in French and has celebrated the Sacraments in Spanish for Faribault's Hispanic Catholics. To add Italian to his mastery of Romance languages he will spend six weeks in Sienna, Italy this autumn.

Fr. Cozzens is not the first Companion of Christ to study in Italy. Newly-ordained Fr. Michael Keating completed his priestly formation at the North American College in Rome.
